Around the Homestead there are stories in eight display stands that are scattered throughout the various rooms. You will find lots of useful and interesting information in these stands that will help with the following activities.




THE SMITH FAMILY CHILDREN

ADELAIDE FRANCES SMITH

Adelaide Smith was a housemaid at Bundoora Homestead. Her mother was the housekeeper, which meant her mum was the boss. Adelaide had a long list of jobs to do before the Smiths even got up each day, including: cleaning and lighting the fireplaces, putting on the kettle, setting the dining table for breakfast, sweeping the floor, cleaning the doorstep and polishing any dirty boots.

How does Bundoora Hospital compare to hospitals today?

After the Smith family sold Bundoora Homestead, it became part of a Hospital. It was a place for injured soldiers to stay and recover in peace and quiet. Patients would do farm work like growing vegetables and tending chickens. It was called Bundoora Repatriation Mental Hospital. The word repatriation means "the return of someone to their own country" and refers to the soldiers that were coming home from war. It was called a mental hospital because it helped the returned soldiers with their mental health rather than with their physical injuries.

Curriculum Links:

This education kit, combined with the Heritage Trail at Bundoora Homestead Art Centre, can be incorporated into History inquiries for Level 2 of the Victorian Curriculum:

By the end of Level 2, students explain aspects of daily life to identify how some aspects have changed over time, while others have remained the same. They describe personal and family life, a person, a site, or an event of significance in the local community.

Students use sources (physical, visual, oral) including the perspectives of others (parents, grandparents) to describe changes to daily life and the significance of people, places or events. They compare objects from the past and present. Students create a narrative about the past using terms and a range of sources.
