THE BLOK! IS THE THIRD WORK FROM A DAYLIGHT CONNECTION

as we once again attempt to poke the stick at the terror that quietly waits at the edges of our existence.

THE BLOK! is the perfect container to interrogate the absurdity of being a professional artist or just a human in a neo-capitalist world where everything is exploited and on the verge of being perfected by AI — a world where our ego, privilege and pride keep us trapped in a reality we collectively created but never consented to.

Societal collapse. Genocide. Mass extinction. Where do we look in in the face of collective global suffering?

What do we say when everything has already been said?

What do we do when nothing changes?

How do we continue to function under the weight of our looming destiny and the guilt of survival?

Who is coming to save us from ourselves?

What is the roles of arts in this reality: to process, provoke, entertain or distract?

In such desperate chaos, where do we turn for answers, inspiration, hope?

We have no idea! But we ask these questions to try and make sense of the global colony in which we reside, to break down and remake the matrix, to play it back to ourselves in some way that makes sense for a moment or make us laugh for a little while. During this hour, on this stage, in this ceremonial circle, we get to determine the lores of creation; make-believe, magic and mayhem. We get to build and destroy the universe.

ABOUT THE BLOK!

RADICAL, BLAK, AND FUNNY AS HELL

A Daylight Connection, led by Kamarra Bell-Wykes and Carly Sheppard, make work that bucks theatre convention. Hilarious and irreverent, this motley crew of visionary renegades are hellbent on reimagining what First Nations performance can be.

THE BLOK! is a wild, satirical battle for creative control. An artist known as The Master, drowning in spiralling ego and crushing writers block (Carly Sheppard), hits rock bottom, and is visited by a divine Blak Creator (Alexis West). The Creator unravels the myths of artistic genius, white patriarchal supremacy, and the singular notion of God.

Constipated by pressure and fame, The Master must confront the limits of their genius and surrender to a force bigger than themselves. As we rapidly hurtle towards our collective extinction, how do we separate the false gods from the real?

THE BLOK! is a spiritually rogue theatre experience that exploits classic genres, pop culture, modern-day tropes, and mythical iconography, to create a sublime feast of divine revelation and ego-fuelled chaos. It is performance as rebellion; creation as disruption - radical, Blak, and funny as hell.

A Daylight Connection is Kamarra Bell-Wykes, Carly Sheppard and small sound with a dazzling line-up of special guest artists, creating work for Mob, for young audiences, and for outsiders like themselves who aren't regular theatre-goers. Based in Naarm (Melbourne), this independent theatre company offers an explosive union of equally weird and talented artists encompassing almost all creative and design roles including, dramaturgy, devising, directing, choreography, performance, set and sound design. Bound by the elusive dream of not only being independent but truly self-determined artists, the collective was formed from a shared love of high-quality, boundary-pushing performance.

Her other significant theatre credits include House Arrest (Yirramboi/Malthouse), A Wake - A Woke Mob (Melbourne Theatre Company/ILBIJERRI), 37 (Melbourne Theatre Company), Romeo and Juliet (Red Stitch Theatre), Because the Night (Malthouse Theatre). 
CARLY SHEPPARD

(Performer) is a Birri Gubba, Wakka Wakka, South Sea Islander and White Australian woman living on Kaurna Country. She is a writer, director, collaborator and performer in film, theatre, poetry, dance and events. Alexis is passionate about First Nation voices, the stories of people with disability, oppression, diversity and collaboration. She has worked as an Artistic Director with Karrikarrinya Theatre Collective. co-written with Elena Carapetis for the State Theatre of South Australia, written and collaborated for Kurruru Youth Arts and No Strings Attached Theatre of Disability.



SMALL SOUND

(Sound Designer & Musician) is the most recent creative incarnation of Melbourne-bornand-based, multi-form artist, multiinstrumentalist and Quandamooka man, Andrew James. Creating, composing and performing original music, sets and sculptural space in response to independent dance, theatre, contemporary art exhibitions and film works for over 25 years has been not just a privilege, but an inevitable evolution. (Stage & Production Manager) is a versatile interdisciplinary stage/ production manager, writer, director and designer with a Bachelor in Performing Arts (Performance Making) from WAAPA. Their work disrupts the concept of what is stageable and possible in live performance contexts - both on and offstage. Holland's debut play *Unnatural* (2024, TBRT), received 6 Performing Arts WA Awards nominations, including Best Independent Production and Outstanding New Work. Recent works include The Machine Stops (Theatre Works), Hometown (Spare Parts Puppet Theatre), and Unnatural (The Blue Room Theatre).
